### Reverend Carrie writes ...

Dear siblings in Christ,

Look up and seek God, Look back and thank God Look around and serve God Look forward and trust God

Each time I sit to write my weekly letter or sermon, I often find myself pondering how to begin. Those first few words can often be the hardest. Likewise, as we come out of our COVID cocoons, slowly emerging from our homes and reconnecting to our community face to face, those first few steps can be daunting. Pre-COVID, we knew who welcomed our hugs, social niceties told us to shake hands, to scooch over and share a pew, to hold the door open for someone, and even to pick up a dropped item, and hand it back to someone. Such simple things no longer seem so simple. How do we regain our footing, finding courage in venturing out again,

reconnecting and finding comfort in our post pandemic world, finding comfort in our long overdue gatherings? I think the answer comes from the invitation above.

In my preparation for our outdoor service in Southampton on Sunday, the first in-person Eucharistic service I have led in over 10 months, I find myself thinking about first steps, and how difficult they sometimes are. I ask myself, how do we come together again, creating welcome, safety, and comfort, and I am reminded of this invitation. An invitation to seek God, thank God, serve God and most importantly, trust God. There has not been a moment of this pandemic when God has not been with us, acting in the world around us, reminding us of God's promise. Yes, we have experienced and heard of tremendous loss, we have felt significant fear, we have all missed important

moments and celebrations, but through it all, God has offered God's constant presence and moments of grace and gift.

At the beginning of the pandemic, many wondered how we could possibly continue in our ministry, how we would gather and hold one another and the world in prayer through communal worship. We discovered we could, through virtual means. We wondered how we would stay in contact and care

for one another, and calling teams were organized, drive-by celebrations happened, new friends near and far were made.

We worried about our financial situation, but even in that we have been blessed with the generous and faithful support of our congregations. While we have not been in a season of financial growth, and have had to rely on some reserves, we have certainly seen the abundance of care and commitment our worshipping families have held faithfully to.

We wonder now, how we will transition from our at-home sacred spaces to outdoor worship spaces to indoor worship spaces, and in this too, God is with us.

Careful planning on the part of your leadership teams, superb guidance from our Bishop's office and local health authorities all come together within the loving hold of God's presence. Where God is, all things are possible. The world looks utterly different through the eyes of grace, and that is what our invitation reminds us of. May our response to God's constant and compassionate invitation lead us all to see the possibilities and joy and grace found within our first steps into a new and opening world.

May God keep you and bless you in all your first steps, first words, and first actions this day.
