Reverend Carrie writes ...

Dear Friends.

It has been a week of prayer and pondering, and so I have struggled in writing this message, causing no end of frustration for our editor, I am sure. The announcement that Her Late Majesty Queen Elizabeth II had died, followed immediately with "God save the King, left me pondering the swiftness in which our voices must move from lament to proclamation.

In a long season of loss and uncertainty, the death of our longest reigning Monarch has unsettled many, me included. But even more poignant for me has been my prayerful pondering on what it means to move from lament to proclamation or thanksgiving.

In the swift proclamation of "God save the King", immediately following Queen Elizabeth's death, we become witnesses to hope and faith given voice for the future. The monarchy does not

end with Queen Elizabeth, as it has not ended with the many monarchs before- it continues. With these words, hope and faith are proclaimed.

In much the same way, we offer that same voice of hope and faith when we remember those who have passed from this life with these words: "Eternal rest grant unto them O'Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them. May the souls of all the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace and rise in glory". There is action beyond peace; there is a risen glory, and that is central to the promise we have been given by God, that death does not have the final word, but life eternal does.

Hope has the final word and looking to the future is a visible and tangible way to express and live out our faith in hope.

Much like our yearly Vestries, where we cast a vision for the year ahead, our newsletters are not only to share and reflect with thanksgiving on what has happened in the past few months, but to announce and proclaim in all hopefulness what is yet to come! Our newsletters are full of information and stories about the work of our hands

and the inspiration of our hearts. What we share is the good news of the gospel lived out here and now. I am so very thankful for the many contributors who have come together to share their stories, articles, and hope!

As we see more and more of our dear friends back in church, may we offer up thanksgiving for the sheer joy of being together again. The last several weeks have felt like Christmas morning as we have seen familiar faces back in the pews. For those who are still more comfortable at home, God bless your

weekly attendance through the technologies of the internet. You are missed but not forgotten. If you would like home communion, I would be very happy, delighted, in fact, to come and have a wee visit.

Another Successful Antique Show!

The St John's Congregation pulled together to host the 44th Saugeen Shores Antique, Vintage and Collectible Show & Sale on July 15 & 16, 2022. After two years of go and stop planning, we were delighted to be back in the Plex working together. The planning committee of Linda and Chuck Stuckey, Rob and Deb Campbell, Rose and Bill Blackwell, Cathy Seaton, Hope Wallace and Barb Gledhill are an amazing team that put together a well-oiled event. We saw a few changes in the lunchroom, now called the Café, with its menu choices, ATM available and marketing, over 25 members of the congregation, friends and family volunteers plus food donations. We welcomed over 880 visitors and 30 vendors to the show, resulting in a profit of \$11,000 (\$4200 from the Café, and \$7000 from the Antique Show itself). The profits will be distributed throughout our community's charity and non-profit organizations to support the needs of our neighbours in Saugeen Shores. We are honoured to give back and feel blessed the event is able to contribute to our outreach goals. Save the date for the 45th show on July 14 and 15th, 2023.


Appreciation for our Mexican Guests Working in Saugeen Shores

The Experience of Camp Huron:

Serenity and Andre Saunders attended camp Huron again this year, supported by Saint Paul's. We had a brief talk so that they could tell everyone all of their experiences while at camp. They excitedly explained that they were among 65 other children from ages 6 to 17 who participated in the last week of August, Sunday through Saturday. New to the camp this year are the bathrooms and showers, and a rock-climbing wall. They were housed in bunks (named after the constellations), organized by age, each with a leader-in-training, and a counsellor. A typical day began with a "polar dip" in the lake, followed by breakfast. Each action-packed day included a variety of sessions. One of these sessions was called Op-Cop (Operation Cooperation), and included such activities as navigating a spider's web of ropes, with the object of helping one another to get to the other side without touching the ropes. Another cooperative game included walking on a rope, stretched between two trees, a short distance off the ground, while others spotted and assisted. Another was the new rockclimbing wall. Other exciting events included archery, games and sports like "gagaball", "Outdoors in the Forest", waterfront and splash pad events, campfires, complete with funny camp songs, crafts, such as making ornaments (Serenity proudly displayed hers hanging from a tree branch in her front yard). All of these activities are typical of an outdoor camp, but what made it a Christian camp? A huge list included "Journeys" (reading and discussing a Bible story), two short daily chapel services of song and prayer, and devotions nightly before bed. Andre excitedly described the food, including buffalo chicken wings (his FAVOURITE!), burritos, and the ever-present "pbjam", just in case you didn't like the food option

served. When asked what was best about the camp, Serenity mentioned the fun of making friends with counsellors and campers. Andre mentioned the games and the FOOD. Did he mention the buffalo chicken wings?!

They recited a new blessing which we might all want to try at meals.
