Introducing St. Paul's New **Custodian Dave Wenn:**



Synod Report

Our 183rd Synod of the Diocese of Huron was an auspicious one for the Regional Ministry of Saugeen Shores, Tara & Chatsworth! Our Rector, Carrie was installed as The Reverend Canon Carrie Irwin! "You have been appointed by the Bishop of Huron as an Honorary Canon of the Cathedral of St. Paul in the Diocese of Huron. Your role, when called upon, is to assist the Bishop with counsel; to be a member of the Cathedral Chapter; to study and demonstrate a discipline of ministry which is of interest; and to be an influence in word and deed toward the health and welfare of the diocese." It was a proud moment for Canon Carrie, her family and all of us.

The 4:30pm service at St. Paul's Cathedral was wonderful (all the voices singing, all the pomp & colour) and the weather was perfect! Following the opening service, we enjoyed a beautiful banquet at the convention centre and our evening of fellowship began.

On Monday morning the business part began in earnest following registration of lay & clergy delegates. Scott Saunders was in charge of that this year due to his new role as Honorary Secretary of Synod! Bishop Todd reflected on "Where We Are" right now and the theme of this Synod, "Singing the Lord's Song in A New Land"! He divided the last few years into parts. Phase 1 was dominated by the pandemic with openings, closings & the resulting loss of people

and places. Phase 2 was recovery, realizing that we were still standing but NOT how it was before. He noted that as new gifts from God become available, there may be some that are lost. "We recover until we don't, and then God steps in and recovers for us." Phase 3 will have us focus on our Diocesan strategy for using the resources we have. He said we will need to have a real desire to shift our focus from maintaining current operations to what he called a **spiritual renewal of focus**.

Our Finance Report was given by the Rev. Dr. Stephen McClatchie who indicated that new processes are still in the works as all are being stream-lined. The Apportionment Formula is one area being reviewed. Just a reminder that apportionment is a "fair share payment to the Diocese to support the wider mission of the church". Our investments have done a bit better and budget talks are already beginning in hope that information will be out earlier so parishes can work on their own new year budgets especially in the area of insurance. INSURANCE seemed to be a big topic in people's minds and rightfully so! Just 5 years ago the



total premium amount for the Diocese was just under \$600,000.00! This past year the cost was 1.7 million dollars! We have moved our Diocese account to AON Toronto in hope of more assistance. Synod meetings are very open to questions and there were queries about why we didn't start up our own insurance coverage. There was also a challenge to a motion aimed at churches who had not paid up their insurance bill and the motion was amended. Synod meetings are really interesting and provide a snapshot of what is going on beyond our little corner of Canada. A report from the Anglican Foundation indicated that this past year had seen a very high rate of Grants and overall the highest year ever of disbursements. This included monies going out to CLAY (Canadian Lutheran Anglican Youth).

The Bishop's Charge is key every year. This year, he pointed out that the early followers of Jesus were really starting up in a whole new way after the **Resurrection**. What facts did they know? He's dead. He's gone. They started to go home and make their way back to the boats...but then he came alongside of them **alive**. The facts changed. Perhaps we too are listening to and seeing facts about the future direction of the church. Should we listen to the message of Jesus? "Go and I will meet you there." In the words of Bishop Todd, we are all part of this strange new world that began in Creation's First Garden and we all know that gardens need to be tended and tilled, looked after & cultivated. We are charged to become a **Learning Church**, a **Just Church** and a **Diverse Church**. Our Bishop believes that if you want to future-proof your church, make it intercultural & intergenerational. Our Diocese is already seeing lots of things happening in the areas of Indigenous Ministry, the Huron Farmworkers ministry and in Youth Ministry. He asks us to think about what things do we want to "tend" and "till"? What things would we like to see in our future plans?

Attending Synod is a joyful experience. There is no strangeness, there is nothing to prevent a "newcomer" from feeling at home. Be brave next year - experience Synod!

National Indigenous Day of Prayer and Summer Solstice Service on June 21.



A wonderful group assembled on the longest day of the year for this service of prayer, psalms and hymns on the Labyrinth at St. Paul's. The service was designed to celebrate the gift of light, and creation and to honour and celebrate the unique heritage, diverse cultures and outstanding contributions of First Nations, Inuit, and Metis people.



Doctorate of Ministry:

"I will instruct you and teach you in the way you should go. I will counsel you with my loving eye on you." Psalm 32.8

This is a verse that I was given back in 2008 when I first started my journey to ordained ministry. A member of our home parish wrote it in a card she gave me the Sunday before I started my Master of Divinity program. I have it written on a label on my computer, and in the front of my planner. I have never been without this verse since I first received it, and I have held fast to its promise: "I will instruct you and teach you in the way you should go". I recently printed up a new label, and it will be put on my lovely new notebook, as I begin a Doctorate of Ministry program in September. The decision to pursue another degree has not been taken lightly, and I spent six months in prayer over the decision. I was delighted to receive the support of our church leadership and from Bishop Todd. The degree will take three years to complete, and I will pursue this while I continue in full time ministry here in our Regional Ministry. Most of my course work will be done online, with three or four trips to the Saskatoon Theological Union, at the Lutheran Theological Seminary, for some intense, five day, in-person course work.

The study I will be engaged in will centre around increasing the capacity of lay leadership in the church at a community level. How do we draw the circle wider and look beyond the diminishing and increasingly burdened leadership teams we have in the church now, while upholding and recognizing the gifts they bring? What do we have to offer that would invite people in, where their skills and gifts are acknowledged, nurtured and given new life? How do we engage in meaningful ways in the community to grow the mission of the church, and how will that look?

The pandemic and its aftermath, like any life altering crisis, has given us a chance to both individually and in community look deeply at the way we live, the way we worship, the way we engage with one another and with the divine, and to ask, "Where do we go from here?" I believe, in part, that it means re-engaging with the community, finding new opportunity to partner with and explore new models, developing a vision that invites people into something where their skills, and talents can find new life and meaning and find a place of spiritual health and growth.

Education is the process of drawing something out, of exposing new learnings, of giving stability to creativity. At a clergy day I recently attended, Bishop Todd Townshend spoke of how creative thinking is like water on the dry earth. Water spilled onto the dry earth creates clay, which God breathes life into, and forms. Pursuing a DMin program at this time for me is the water that keeps me from being dry and lifeless. I believe that God is breathing life into this desire and will form it into something that will contribute in a tiny but meaningful way to bring life and health to our unfolding church, both at our local level and beyond. Thank you for your support and prayers as we navigate this new adventure together. Please feel free to reach out and ask me about this program if you have any questions or concerns.

It's early morning (I mean really early) and I'm in my outdoor reflection place with breakfast done, second cup of coffee in hand, two Sudokos and a crossword puzzle done, a candle lit and I have beautiful spot to just (try) to slow down the world for just a little

while.

There is a neighbourhood cat, who we all call "Blue", that seems to only come around when I am sitting on my porch taking a time out.
