


Celtic 4-piece band. She also performs with Juanita Wilkins, a Canadian singer and song writer.

Lent with Leonard Cohen:

This year's Lenten Study involves listening to the songs of Leonard Cohen, and using simple, creative ways to respond, that stir our hearts, souls, and minds in deeply – felt ways.



Week One Song: "In My Secret Life"

Lent is traditionally a time of self-examination, but it is the opposite of self-absorption. Lenten examination is a clear-eyed look at the fantasies, inconsistencies, moments of clarity, and parts of the self that we want to hide from others, even ourselves, and especially God. Cohen's song is just such a clear-eyed view of this "secret life".

Week Two Song: "Come Healing"

Lent is a season when we can give free rein to our own longings for healing in ourselves and in the world. This song gives voice to those longings and the many forms healing can and needs to take.

Week Three Song: "Anthem"

Half way through Lent, we can be tempted to feel like we're 'failing' Lent. Our disciplines and promises are broken and uneven. This song is an invitation to return to the present and its possibilities; not to be stuck, but to return

to rejoicing with all our cracks. Maybe at this point in Lent we can come into the awareness that Lent is God's work in us. We're simply here to make room for that work to happen.

Week Four Song: "If It Be Your Will"

This is a song of deep longing and surrender. It's not hard to imagine its sentiment as akin to the prayer of Jesus in the garden of Gethsemane before his arrest and crucifixion. It might be the closest of Cohen's songs in form and content to the laments

and longings of the psalms.

Week Five Song: "Love Itself"

In the last song before we enter the journey of Holy Week, this song speaks of a powerful; experience in an ordinary place. In a sunlit room, the singer glimpses how love transforms everything and dissolves the separation between all creation and the creator—the named and the nameless one. At the same time, the singer experiences the uncontainable, paradoxical nature of Love.

The Regional Ministry Lenten Study takes place each Wednesday in March, from 7:00—8:30, in Bevan Hall at St. Paul's. Each week ends with a brief chapel service in the church. You are most welcome to join this study group.

The Reverend Canon Carrie Irwin:

Bishop Todd Townshend of the Anglican Diocese of Huron has announced the appointment of The Reverend Carrie Irwin as "Canon Catechist" along with 6 other Anglican Priests within the Diocese of Huron (The Reverend Dr. Grayhame Bowcott, The Reverend Dr. Stephen Hendry, The Reverend Mark Loyal, The Reverend Dr. Gordon Maitland, The Reverend Dr. Preston Parsons and The Reverend Dr. Lisa Wang). These appointments were effective February 19, 2023.

Reverend Carrie has been the Priest in Charge of the Regional Ministry of Saugeen Shores, Tara & Chatsworth for 8 years, and the Regional Dean of the Deanery of the Saugeens (encompassing the Anglican churches from the Blue Mountains in the east and Saugeen Shores in the

west, and the Bruce Peninsula in the north to Durham in the south) for 7 years.

What is a Canon Catechist in the Diocese of Huron?

A catechist is someone who lets the Word of God echo through their life. They often demonstrate a life-long pursuit of the meaning and value of Christian faith in order to help others recognize the gospel in their own lives. The Canon Catechists will have a particular role in striving to share the joy of learning and faith-formation with all. They will also hold special responsibility for recognizing these gifts in lay members of the church, and, fostering this leadership and the catechetical life of the whole people of God.

Canon Carrie Irwin personifies this definition, as her entire life is dedicated to sharing the joy of Christian learning, faith formation, and recognizing the Gospel in everyone she encounters.

Canon Carrie will be formally recognized in her new role and will be honoured along with her fellow Canon Catechist appointees at the Huron Diocesan Synod Service in

London on May 28, 2023.



DID YOU KNOW?...

Nestled just off Bayview Ave., on Cummer Ave. in Toronto is an amazing Guest House! It is run by the Sisters of St. John the Divine and is part of their convent. The Sister-

hood of St. John the Divine was founded

in 1884

Our former Primate Archbishop Fred Hiltz and his wife Lynne are both very involved with SSJD. He says, "While prayer has always been their first and foremost work, the sisters have given themselves to numerous other ministries including nursing, tending the elderly, teaching and working with the poor. They continue to provide pastoral care at St. John's Rehab, now part of Sunnybrook Health Sciences Centre."

The convent itself is made up of many parts. The chapel is beautiful and guests are welcome to join in Morning Prayer, Holy Eucharist, Evening Prayer and/or Compline (Night Prayer). They have a spacious library- a quiet place to research or read. A book display made up of new and classic spiritual books lines one main hallway. A garden courtyard and a wonderful labyrinth are always visible through windows that let in lots of light. Although the warmer months allow better access to outside areas, even in the winter the outdoor areas are serene. The refectory is also available to guests with three very healthy home-cooked meals daily. The Sisters usually eat in silence and it is amazing how silence brings many thoughts to mind. Paying attention to what ideas & thoughts come to you during these quiet times is rewarding.

> All in all, this place is such a comfort to be in. At different times, there are retreats and book studies offered. Some folks check in to have a day or two to recharge, chill out, perhaps meet with a spiritual advisor. In my case, I've had treatments during the week and have been here for 6 weeks now. You might consider the Guest House if you have an appointment or procedure in Toronto.

The Sisters themselves are so kind, so welcoming, so caring. In these times still considering COVID, masks are worn and hand sanitizer is used to pick up food in the Refectory but even with masks and silence, a comforting look and an "eye" smile is hard to miss!

I will be adding a copy of the book "A Journey Just Begun- The Story of an Anglican Sisterhood" in our library soon. Find out more about this wonderful resource and place of divine spirituality.

From the Priest Assistant's Pew:

It's March already and the sun is shining and the world is clearer and bluer (soon to be greener). You're probably wondering where I get the joy to say all this when it may not be so when you read this. I had the opportunity to travel to Ecuador and the Galapagos Islands at the end of January for a journey of a lifetime. There are a few pictures in this newsletter to show you the

sun (it was 35C with the hu-

midity), the surf (yes the Pacific Ocean was that calm) and the flora and fauna that make up the incredibleness that is the Southern Hemisphere. To have dozens of hummingbirds land on your hand as you feed them was a spectacular feeling. To walk up a volcano that only erupted 5 years prior was somewhat terrifying but also amazing. To eat Ecuadorian food (plantains, rice and fish dozens of ways) and listen to the sea lions bark most of the night was just an assault (a good one) to the senses, all of them!

To take a break away from North America, what we call day to day life and immerse self into a completely different culture, language and ecology has made me realize that our world is a spectacular world with emphasis on us, as humans, on preserving and protecting what has grown and thrived before we even came along.

So I reflected what do we, as a church, need to grow and

thrive the way we always have been? Well, there's the

catch, it will never be the way it's always been. It can't. We can understand where we've come from, appreciate the hopes and dreams of our ancestors but it's the Grace of God that gives us the gifts to share what we have right NOW.

In the Galapagos there is tremendous effort not to look back so much but to look forward to what will be with breeding and nurturing centres for their beloved land tortoises. There is hope for the future with the endeavours of conservation and maintenance of what they have with the vision of growth, which may be slow, but it is happening, each and every day. The 130 year old

land tortoise I stood next to on Floreana Island was there not because of today's causes but the vision, hope and care of those that have gone before to make sure that tortoise had a place to roam.

If we nurture the plans of today that may not look like yesterday, we have hope for the future. No, we don't know what that will look like at all but we

can, God willing, give it a solid place to springboard from. I saw it first hand and I know it can be reality!
