Reverend Carrie writes . .

Put a spring in your step for Lent!

Spring is such a lovely time of the year, a time when all things feel possible. It is a time to feel positive, strong, committed, and yes, even adventurous! And, spring is just around the corner. The three feet of snow in your front garden may lead you to doubt this, but Spring is a mere 29 days away.

It is hard to believe that we are already half way through February, and that Lent is upon us. I just found a Christmas decoration on my desk yesterday. How can it be Lent when I haven't even finished clearing up from Christmas? The year is moving on, and so it is with the church year. It also moves forward, towards exciting things to come. In no time at all, we will be celebrating Easter once again—the major, most exciting and important time in our calendar.

We have eaten our fill of pancakes and sausages. We have managed to celebrate Valentines Day and Ash Wednesday on the same day - and no, I did not mark any foreheads with a heart; the cross is already the greatest symbol of love we have!

The Ash Wednesday service begins our Lenten journey, and for many this begins as a quiet, reflective, and contemplative time, and indeed it is. It is also, if you let it be, a time of personal spiritual growth. Lent is a good time

Join us at our midweek services, Lenten lunches, and Bible Study. Our Lenten study this year is called "Meeting Jesus in the Gospel of John." We meet at 10:30 am on Tuesday mornings at St Paul's, and at 7 pm on Thursday evenings at St John's. Everyone is welcome!

I will end by sharing this prayer from our Lenten study. Loving God, you gave us your Son Jesus Christ so that all may be drawn to him. We ask you to bless our time together, and to give us grace and courage to meet Jesus wherever he may be found. We ask this by the grace of your Holy Spirit.

Meeting Jesus in the Gospel of John

Have you ever wished to deepen your relationship with God? To experience a warm friendship with God? Maybe even fall in love with God – again – or for the very first time? If so, read on!

"God Emmanuel is so palpable in John's Gospel; it invites me to be in God's presence just as I am, for good or ill, to be welcomed, provided for, sustained by Jesus. Praying with John, I feel a profound sense of not being alone." -Br. Curtis Almquist, SSJE

Meeting Jesus in the Gospel of John invites participants on a six-week journey into deeper intimacy with God by praying with the words of John the Evangelist (The Gospel According to John and First Letter of John). These two texts describe how God, out of deep love, sends God's only Son Jesus into the world, to take on human form and live among us. By learning from Jesus, his human friendships, and his teachings about the God he calls 'Father,' we will discover God as One who longs for deep intimacy with each of us. We will take to heart the words of Jesus: "I and the Father are one." We will find that God is not a judge, a disapproving parent, a policeman, or a taskmaster; rather God is our companion, our friend, our confidant, our beloved. We are even invited to abide in God as God abides in us. It is in relationship with Jesus that such extraordinary communion with God becomes a personal reality.

With a beautiful <u>prayer journal</u> and <u>facilitation guidance</u> <u>for small groups</u>, from the Center for the Ministry of Teaching, and videos from the monks of the Society of Saint John the Evangelist (SSJE), **Meeting Jesus** is a sixweek journey and reflection on the Gospel According to John.

Join the study group at St. Paul's, Southampton on Tuesdays at 10:30, following Morning Prayer at 10. Or, join our other group at St. John's on Thursdays at 7 PM.

Book Talk by Becky Peters, Librarian:

Jesus Manifesto: Restoring the Supremacy and Sovereignty of Jesus Christ" By Leonard Sweet and Frank Viola (2010)

"Leonard Sweet, one of the authors of this excellent book, was the keynote speaker at the two final "53rd Weekends" -- an annual inspirational event spanning 4 decades, attended by many Anglicans. "Jesus Manifesto" comes highly recommended by Rowan Williams, former Archbishop of Canterbury, who notes that this is an "exhilarating reintroduction to a Jesus who sometimes seems to have become a stranger to the church".

From the introduction: "The body of Christ is at a crossroads right now. The two common alternatives are to move either to the left or the right. It's our observation, however, that we are living in a unique time, when people are frozen as they look in either of those two directions. When they look to the left, they decide that they cannot venture there. When they look to the right, they feel the same. Whether they realize it or not, people are looking for a fresh alternative -- A THIRD WAY. The crossroads today, we believe, is one of moving forward or backward. What we will present in this book, therefore, is razorsharp, cut-glass clarity of the Lord Jesus Christ as the Alpha and the Omega. We will show that HE is that third way -- and the only way -- that we can forge a secure path into the future. If the church does not reorient and become Christological at its core, any steps taken will be backwards."

And so they begin to articulate the glory of the gospel, which is the invitation to live our lives by an indwelling Lord, the fullness of Christ incarnated in us both individually and corporately. He is the most exciting person in the universe, bar none, claim these writers. But they are speaking about the REAL Christ, not the insipid one promoted today. This "real" Jesus gave his disciples breath and body, wounds to touch and hands to heal. Not an intellectual belief or Christian worldview but a relational faith, an indwelling Presence. There is no disconnect between Jesus of the gospels and the all-sufficient cosmic Christ of the epistles. We are called to come and see His radiance.

Sweet and Viola write with hearts burning for Jesus the Christ, that He may be known fully in and through His Church.

From the Deacon's Bench

As I prepared to write an article for our newsletter I thought I might have a title for the page. For some reason "From the Deacon's Bench" popped into my head. From where , I don't

have the faintest, but then it got me really thinking. What is a Deacon's Bench? Is it significant? Ah, something to research and to learn in my new role as Deacon Assistant to the Rector. So I found the following: "A Deacon is

someone who assists the pastor, rector, or priest of the church – as the case may be – with his or her various spiritual duties. It seems that at some point in our country's early history (around 1922) it became customary for a simple bench with an upright back to be set aside in the sanctuary for ONLY the deacons to sit upon. Often set at a 90 degree angle to the pulpit or lectern, this bench was


used by the deacons during services and for special church functions. Naturally, the bench came to be known as the Deacon's Bench – and so the term stuck – and subsequently, wooden benches with very high and straight backs are today referred to as Deacon's Benches and are now often used at entry points in a home." Well, that is quite interesting! We don't have an official Deacon's Bench in any of our 4 congregations but where I do sit when assisting Rev Carrie on a Sunday is a bench (pew) that is 90 degrees to the pulpit, so I guess we're fulfilling the requirement of a Deacon's bench at St. Paul's Southampton.
