Book Talk:

Calvin Miller: Poet, Pastor, Theologian,

Painter

Our resource library has in its possession four books written by this versatile author. "The Singer Trilogy" consists of three illustrated books of allegorical poetry in the tradition of C.S. Lewis's Narnia series. They parallel the story of the Gospels and the Book of Acts. The trilogy was published in the 1970's, and "though the binding cracks and the pages start to yellow" (Dan Fogelberg), they are yet a delightful read. The pencil sketches are detailed and innovative.

"Into the Depths of God" was written more recently by Calvin Miller, the theologian - although his poetic nature also graces this serious exploration of prayerful intimacy with God. "No eye has seen, no ear has heard, no mind has conceived what God has prepared for those who love him" (I Cor. 2:9) is the scripture that frames the content of this book. Miller assures us that deep spirituality is not some distant thing for which we must struggle. It is, in fact, the opposite because God is near. We have access to the vast ocean of his presence, yet too often content our-



selves with snorkelling in the shallows. Prayer, says the author, is the "gleaming doorway to the depths". It is about relationship, rather than about telling God what to do or demanding that he tell us exactly where our lives are going. "God is to be met with and listened to, not sat down and talked to". There is both suffering and joy in our



faith pilgrimage, found between the seeking of Christ and the finding of him. Jesus is our calling, our life, our all in all. According to Miller, "his adoration is the only worthy passion of our lives". This comprehensive book merits a studious reading.
